The course deals with the fundamentals of International Maritime Law, focusing particularly on issues such as the liability of Ship Owners and Ship Operators. Attention is given to the international nature of shipping and therefore the course comprises a range of legal instruments, International Conventions and case law. The module examines also the law governing the rights and obligations of merchant seamen, including statutes, rules and comparative case law.
